"HUNTER, John Dunn, adventurer, born in a settlement west of the Mississippi about 1798; died near Nacogdoches, Texas, early in 1827. According to his own narrative he was made captive by the Kickapoo Indians when an infant, and adopted into the family of one of the principal warriors. He afterward fell into the hands of a party of Kansas Indians, and was finally received among the Osages, where he was adopted for the third time. He was dangerously wounded in an engagement with the Canis, and before he had recovered was taken by the Osages across the Rocky mountains into the valley of Columbia river, and up to its mouth. After travelling southward toward the affluents of the Rio del Norte, and receiving from the Indians the name of the "Hunter," on account of his skill in the chase, he went with them toward the

affluents of the Mississippi, meeting traders often by the way. The treacherous conduct of his companions toward the latter disgusted Hunter, and, after several exciting incidents and some internal struggles, he determined in 1817 to cast his lot with the whites. He managed to reach New Orleans, and, after realizing a considerable sum by the sale of the furs that he possessed, he attended the schools of the city and learned the English language. Here he assumed the name that the Indians had given him. He was in Kentucky in 1821, pursuing his studies, and afterward, by the advice and help of friends, visited Baltimore, Philadelphia, New York, and other cities. He was pressed on all sides to publish a narrative of his life among the Indians, and was assisted by Edward Clarke in the composition of his work, which appeared in 1823, and was received with much favor. Its success, however, was checked soon afterward. Duponceau, a Frenchman living in Philadelphia, who had long been engaged in researches on the idioms of the American Indians, met Hunter, and, after several conversations with him, became convinced that he was an "impostor, and entirely ignorant of the language he claimed to know." He told Hunter so, and published his opinion. The statement of Duponceau first met with little belief, but it was supported by some of those who had formed part of the expedition to the Rocky mountains of Major Stephen H. Long in 1819-'20. Hunter now embarked for England, where he met with a flattering reception. The Royal society believed him a man that had been specially raised by Providence to carry the benefits of intellectual training to the Indians, and he pointed out the means of arriving at this end in the preface to the English reprint of his book. After receiving many valuable gifts, and being presented to the royal family, he returned to the United States, where he met with a renewal of the charges against him. In the "North American Review" he was denounced in an article by General Cass as "one of the boldest impostors that had appeared in the literary world since the days of Psahnanazar," and at the same time the author of the article accumulated a mass of irresistible proofs against him. Hunter made no attempt to refute these charges. He went to Mexico and endeavored to obtain from the government of that country the grant of an immense territory on which he proposed to settle a colony of Indians. He assured the Mexicans that he would thus form a rampart on their frontiers that would be capable of resisting "every encroachment on the part of the United States. His proposal was rejected, and he went to Texas, where he became one of the chiefs of the party that was trying to secure its independence. After an unsuccessful attempt at a revolution, he was killed by an Indian whom he had persuaded to join in it. Hunter's work is entitled "Manners and Customs of Several Indian Tribes located West of the Mississippi" (Philadelphia, 1823; reprinted in London the same year, under the title "Memoirs of a Captivity among the Indians of North America, from Childhood to the Age of Nineteen"). It was translated into German by Wilhelm A. Lindau (Dresden, 1824), and also into Swedish (Mariefred, 1826)"(www.famousamericans.net).

"Napoleon Achille Murat, author, born in Paris, 21 January, 1801 ; died in Wascissa, Jefferson County, Florida, 15 April, 1847. He was the son of Joachim Murat, king of Naples, and bore in his youth the title of Prince of Two Sicilies. When King Joachim lost his throne in 1815, young Murat sought a refuge with his mother, a sister of Napoleon 1., in the castle of Frohsdorf, in Lower Austria. He received there a fine education, but in 1821 left Europe for the United States, where he afterward resided. On his arrival in New York he made immediate application for naturalization, and, after a few months' sojourn in that city, made an extensive tour through the United States. On reaching Florida, he was so much impressed with the climate of the country that he bought a large estate near Tallahassee, built there a magnificent home, and divided his time between farming, cattle-breeding, hunting, and fishing. He was elected alderman of the city in 1824, mayor in the following year, and in 1826 appointed postmaster, which office he held till 1838. When Lafayette revisited the United States, Murat joined him in Baltimore, and accompanied him to Washington, and during most of his journey through the country. Lafayette introduced him to Catharina Dudley, a grandniece of Washington, and Murat, conceiving an attachment for her, asked for her hand. Although her family at first objected to the union, they were persuaded through the personal entreaties of Lafayette, and the ceremony took place at Washington on 30 July, 1826. Murat and his bride went immediately to Wascissa, notwithstanding the entreaties of their friends, who promised him a political career if he would settle in Virginia. He also declined in 1832 a nomination for congress that was tendered him by the Democrats of Richmond. He continued to live quietly in Florida, devoting his large fortune to aid benevolent institutions, and for the welfare of the people. As early as 1828 he published in the "Revue trimestrielle" of Paris letters on America, in which he gave curious and interesting details concerning political parties in the United States, and the new states of the Union, that were the means of giving Europeans more accurate information of this country. These letters were afterward published under the following title" "" Lettres d'un citoyen des Etats-Unis a ses amis d'Europe" (Paris, 1830). Murat also published "Esquisses morales et politiques sur les Etats-Unis d'Amerique (2 vols., Paris, 1838), and "Exposition des principes du gouvernement republicain tel qu'il a ete perfectionne en Amerique" (1838). This last work enjoyed a great reputation, passed through more than fifty editions, and is still the manual of the Democrats in western Europe. It was translated into English, German, Dutch, and other languages, and its publication in Italy was forbidden by the Austrian government, as many believed that, in spite of the republican principles that were advocated by the author, he was a pretender, and that

his book was an elaborate and able manifesto Murat died childless, leaving large sums of money to charitable institutions. His wife resided on her plantation till her death on 6 August, 1867. During the civil war her estate suffered from both armies, and at its close she received from Napoleon III. a life annuity of 20,000 francs. Shortly after the war she visited France, and was received at the imperial court with great cordiality.--Napoleon Achille's brother, Napoleon Lucien Charles Joseph Francois, born in Milan, Italy, 16 May, 1803; died in Paris, France, 11 April, 1878, lived with his mother and brother in the castle of Frohsdorf from 1815 till 1822, when he went to Venice, but, being persecuted by the Austrian authorities, he took passage in 1824 for the United States. He was shipwrecked on the coast of Spain and detained there as a prisoner for several months, but his brother, who was already a naturalized American citizen, invoked the protection of President Monroe, and, through the United States minister, young Murat was set at liberty, and arrived in Boston in April, 1825. He then joined his uncle, Joseph Bonaparte, who was living in Philadelphia under the name of Count of Survilliers, and, by advice of his brother, made application for naturalization papers. He went afterward to live with the latter in Florida, and also travelled through the court-try as far as Texas and California. In 1827 he married, in Baltimore, Carolina Georgina, daughter of Thomas Frazer, of Bordentown, New Jersey, and lived in the former city for a few years. Reverses of fortune afterward compelled Murat to keep a boarding-house in 1834, but his wife established a school for young ladies, which became fashionable and enabled him to give up this pursuit. They lived prosperously for a few years, but Murat had never abandoned the idea of recovering the lost throne to which his brother had relinquished all claims. He made trips to France in 1839 and 1844, to confer with his adherents, but was allowed to remain only five weeks at a time. Nevertheless, he kept up a daily correspondence with the supporters of the imperial cause, and held meetings at his house in Baltimore. After the fall of Louis Philippe in 1848, he returned to France with his wife, was elected a deputy to the constituent assembly, and re-elected in 1849, being also appointed in the latter year minister to Turin. In 1852 he was created a senator and given the rank of prince. He published a manifesto in 1861, in which he claimed the throne of his father, but, not being supported by Napoleon III., he withdrew his claim. In 1870 he was shut up with Marshal Bazaine in Metz, and after the fall of the empire he revisited the United States, where he had still some business interests. Madame Murat died on 10 February, 1879. They left five children. CAROLINE LAETITIA, born in Baltimore in 1832, married Baron de Chassiron, who died in 1870, and she married in 1871 John Garden, a wealthy American; JOSEPH JOACHIM, born in Baltimore in 1834, became a major-general in the French army; ANNA, born in Baltimore in 1848, married the Duke de Mouchy; ACHILLE NAPOLEON, born in Baltimore in 1847, married Princess Dadiani de Mingrelia; and LOUIS NAPOLION, born in Paris in 1851, married Princess Maria Orbeliani. Murat's correspondence while he was in the United States, and his letters concerning this country, have been published several times" (Edited Appletons Encyclopedia, Copyright © 2001 VirtualologyTM)

"Son of the scientist-explorer Adolf Erik Nordenskiöld and cousin of explorer-geographer Otto Nordenskiöld, he made zoological expeditions to Patagonia (1899) and Argentina and Bolivia (1901-02) but turned to archaeological research in the mountains of Peru and Bolivia (1904-05). He made two subsequent expeditions to the forestlands bordering Bolivia and Brazil, one noteworthy result being his paper (1912) dealing with mounds and urn burials in Bolivia. In 1913 he became principal curator of ethnology at the Göteborg Museum. His final expedition took him to the Chocó and Kuna (Cuna) Indians of Colombia and Panama (1927). Pioneering in methods of mapping the distribution of many elements of South American culture, he succeeded in developing a remarkably clear reconstruction of cultural history in an area of considerable complexity.

In addition to accounts of his travels written in a semipopular vein, Nordenskiöld wrote many scientific articles and books, including the richly illustrated work *L'Archéologie du bassin de l'Amazone* (1930; "Archaeology of the Amazon Basin"). His major work is *Comparative Ethnographical Studies*, 10 vol. (1918-38), in which he analyzed the material culture of Bolivian tribes and sought to relate natural environment and other influences on cultural patterns. He was skeptical of the theory of Kulturkreis ("culture sphere"), which postulates early diffusion of cultural elements from a primeval area of human development. He suggested that if there were Oceanian influences in South America, they dated from an extremely remote antiquity and that impetus to high civilization of America was Indian" (www.britannica.com).

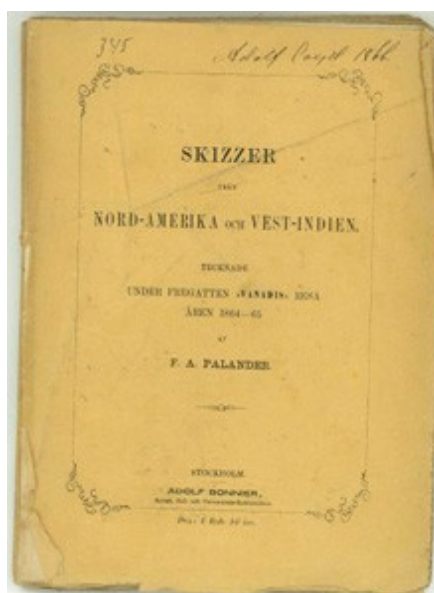

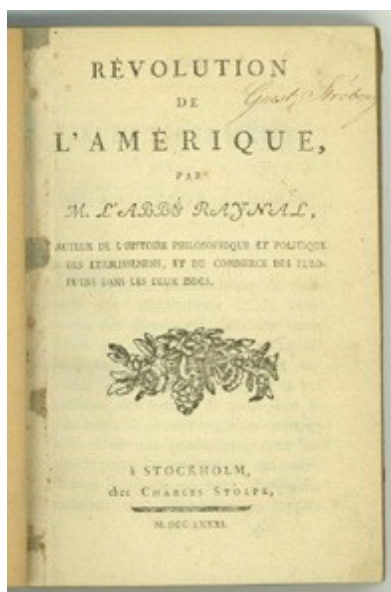

"The Swedish physician and botanist Anders Regnell graduated in 1837 and left Sweden for Brazil in 1840 because he suffered from weak health due to haemorrhage of the lungs. Evidently, he recovered somewhat already during the voyage to South America, and after passing an exam at the Faculty of Medicine in Rio de Janeiro, he started off to the small village of Caldas in the province of Minas Geraes, 1200 meters above sea level, where he lived until his death in 1884. Thanks to his solid education and clinical experience, Regnell soon had a lucrative practice. He acquired real estate and coffee plantations, and increased his fortune.

With inexhaustible eagerness, Regnell collected plants, and he expanded his house to create more room for his herbarium. Large parts of his collections were examined for Martius' *Flora Brasiliensis*.

Regnell was a recluse and a bachelor, but several people lived for long periods as his guest at Caldas. Many were visiting botanists who made large and important collections that were deposited in the Regnellian herbarium. Apart from a large number of species, three genera have been named in his honour, viz. *Regnellia* (Orchidaceae), *Neoregnellia* (Sterculiaceae), and *Regnellidium* (Marsiliaceae).

Regnell planned a "Brazilian Institution" and the Swedish Museum of Natural History in Stockholm was intended as the location for this (now the Regnellian Herbarium). He procured financial means for a continuous curation of the collections and for making field trips to collect more material. Regnell's donations to botany is administered by the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences, but he was also a benefactor of Uppsala University and Karolinska Institutet in Stockholm. His aim was to support biological and medical research" (Arne Anderberg, www.nrm.se).

"Stefansson, Vilhjalmur, born , Nov. 3, 1879, Arnes, Man., Can., died Aug. 26, 1962, Hanover, N.H., U.S. , explorer and ethnologist who spent five consecutive record-making years exploring vast areas of the Canadian Arctic after adapting himself to the Eskimo way of life. Of Icelandic descent, Stefansson lived for a year among the Eskimo in 1906-07, acquiring an intimate knowledge of their language and culture and forming the belief that Europeans could "live off the land" in the Arctic by adopting Eskimo ways. From 1908 to 1912, he and the Canadian zoologist Rudolph M. Anderson carried out ethnographical and zoological studies among the Mackenzie and Copper Eskimo of Coronation Gulf, in Canada's Northwest Territories.

Between 1913 and 1918 Stefansson extended his exploration of the Northwest Territories. His party was divided into two groups; the southern one, under Anderson, did survey and scientific work on the north mainland coast from Alaska eastward to Coronation Gulf, while the northern group travelled extensively in the northwest, discovering the last unknown islands of the Canadian archipelago, Borden, Brock, Meighen, and Longheed. Stefansson's knowledge of the Canadian Arctic led him to predict that the area would become economically important. In World War II he was an adviser to the U.S. government, surveyed defense conditions in Alaska, and prepared reports and manuals for the armed forces. From 1947 he was Arctic consultant at Dartmouth College, Hanover, N.H. He wrote a number of books, including *My Life with the Eskimo* (1913), *The Friendly Arctic* (1921), *Unsolved Mysteries of the Arctic* (1939), and *Discovery* (1964)"(Britannica.com).

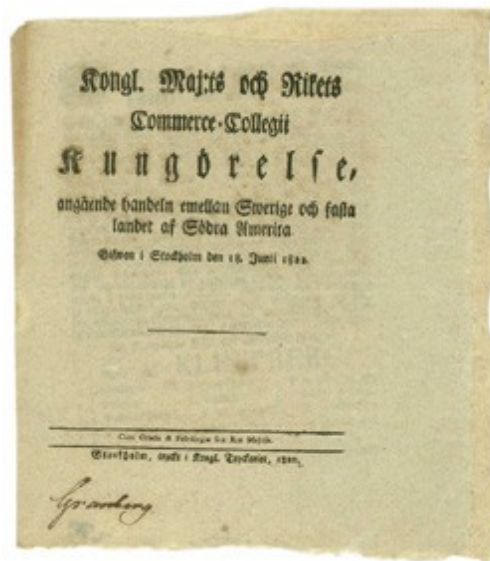

...Advancing through the woods the regiment came into an open field, where they attacked the enemy and drove him across the field and the adjoining heights. The regiment occupied these heights until relieved the next morning ...
The scene was later immortalized in a painting by Thulstrup. Their Brigadier, William Irwin had this to say:
The Twentieth New York Volunteers by its position was exposed to the heaviest fire in [the Brigade] line, which it bore with unyielding courage and returned at every opportunity. The firmness of this regiment deserves very great praise. Colonel Von Vegesack was under fire with his men constantly, and his calm courage gave an admirable example to them. Each of their stand of colors is rent by the balls and shells of the enemy, and their killed and wounded is 145. This regiment was under my own eye in going into action and frequently during the battle, and I take pleasure in strongly testifying to its bravery and good conduct.
He was with the Regiment from Fredericksburg in December through Chancellorsville in May 1863. He mustered out with them at the expiration of their term (1 June 1863) at New York City. He may have been a volunteer aide thereafter to General Meade, possibly including Gettysburg, finally resigning from US service in August 1863.¹

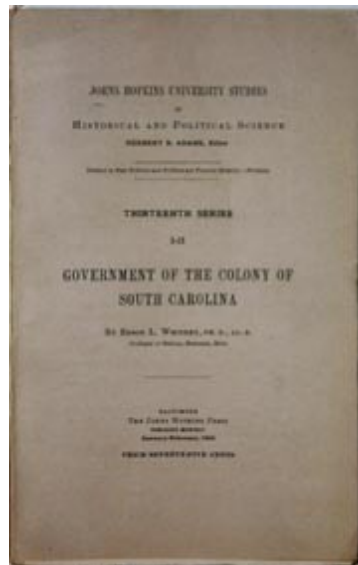

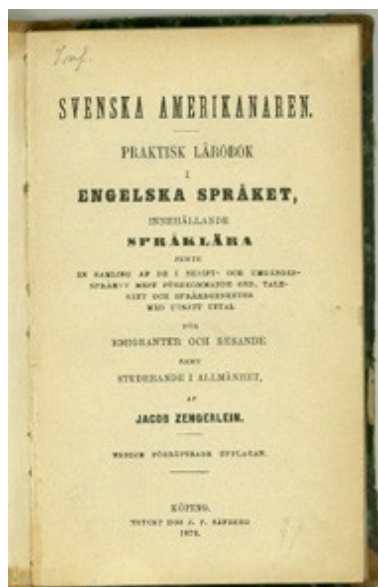
